Community Safety Night Team service would cease to be delivered during a Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday night between 5.30pm and 2.30am Police Scotland will respond to noise calls within the city during these hours. Community Improvement Partnerships will no longer have access to six officers within localities or to target hot spot areas of antisocial behaviour between the hours of 5.30pm and 10pm on Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday nights

The proposal to withdraw the Community Safety Night Service is part of the wider City of Edinburgh budget consultation. Two public meetings were held during November and December, consultation was held through the council consultation hub, leaflets and newspaper articles were produced, social media was used to advertise consultation.
