Data on populations in need	Y	The current evidence and data on homelessness in Scotland highlights how certain protected characteristic groups are more at risk of homelessness than others - The Council does not profile people using homelessness services therefore the Furnishings and Furniture service for Temporary Accommodation and CFTs is available to all whether a person possesses a protected characteristic or not.		
Data on service uptake/access	Y	There is CEC internal data e.g. Northgate, financial spending reports, etc. that will show uptake/access, however this data is not drilled down into specific protected characteristics as the service is available to all whether a person possesses a protected characteristic or not.

Y	The current literature and evidence on homelessness in Scotland points to people experiencing homelessness having greater experience of socio- economic disadvantage, low income, low wealth, material deprivation and area deprivation in general. This is a non- discriminatory service provided to all people experiencing homelessness by the Council regardless of protected characteristics.
