1. Introduction

CFA Archaeology were approached by the City of Edinburgh Council to undertake recording of a mural within 23 Seafield Road East (Fig.1). Planning permission has been granted for the demolition and redevelopment of the site which will result in the loss of the mural. There was no archaeological condition attached to planning permission, but it was decided a basic record should be made of the Mural. The building was formerly owned by Carlsberg Group and the elephant murals relate to their ownership.

Carl Jacobsen the founder of Carlsberg Brewing chose the symbol of the elephant because it represented strength, loyalty and industriousness. Elephants feature heavily at Carlsberg's headquarters in Copenhagen mostly famously in the Elephant Gate.

1.2 Aims and objectives

The aims and objectives are:

- To record by standard photography and photogrammetry the decorative tile mural prior to demolition.
- Provide an illustrated report on the results of the survey.

2. Methodology

The Carlsberg Archives in Copenhagen were contacted but they did not hold any information on either the building or the mural. An extensive internet search was undertaken but no information on the date of the building or the mural could be found.

2.2 Photographic Survey

CFA uses a Sony Alpha 7 II to take digital photographs of structures and specific architectural features.

A detailed photographic record was produced of the stair well that contained the mural, and of the murals themselves. Photogrammetry was used to record the murals.

4. Photographic Survey Results

4.1 General

The elephant murals are situated within a stairwell at the back of the building (Plate 1) Fig.2. They are attached to the side walls of the staircase and there is a large window overlooking the sea formed of six panels. The stairs treds and half landings were originally timber, but the lower landing and bottom flight have been replaced with checker plate. The stairs a fitted with a decorative banister (Plate 2). The handrail is varnished wood with decorative metal panels and posts painted cream. The upper landing and ground floor have a tiled surface made of

small square ceramic tiles (Plate 3). Most of the tiles have a speckled grey finish with randomly located red, mustard, blue and grey tiles replicating the colours in the murals (Plate 4).

4.2 The murals

The tiled murals originally covered the southeast and northwest walls of the stair wells (Plate 5 and Plate 6) Fig 3,3.1. It appears they were later covered by wallpaper which has been largely removed. The walls are covered in polychromatic tiles featuring a geometric pattern. Evenly spaced within the design are 4 tiles forming the stylised letter C (Plate 7). The same stylised letter has been used to form the elephant's trunk.

By the 1960s Mid Century Modern (MCM) was the predominant design style. The style used natural materials such as pale timbers along with lighter or thinner looking fittings, (Plate 1& Plate 2), as a reaction to the dark woods and chunkier, highly decorated earlier Victorian/Edwardian style. MCM also used a lighter colour palette and made use of simple geometric patterns again as a reaction to the earlier, darker Victorian/Edwardian palette and its overly intricate designs. Pastels and oranges as accents against pale off whites were preferred, this can be seen in the murals use of sky blue and yellow ochre (Plate 3) and again reflected in the tiled floor (Plate 4).

No information relating to the dates that Carlsberg operated from this building could be found but the stylistic grounds are strong for dating the building construction and the murals creation to the 1960's. No evidence could be found to attribute the murals to an individual artist though they could also have been created by Carlsberg's own internal design team as part of the building's construction.
