1. Title of proposal

Development of a Continuing Care – Supporting Care Leavers Policy – Annual Review (June 2025)

2. What will change as a result of this proposal?

The policy outlines responsibilities for Council colleagues supporting children and young people who are looked after and leaving care, to support assessments and care planning decisions specifically for those who are eligible for continuing care to help prepare them for adulthood and independent living.

A review of the Continuing Care Policy was undertaken and there were no changes. Procedures and guidance documents are currently being reviewed and developed, and ongoing engagement is taking place with stakeholders, including young people. A further IIA will be held and published as part of this work.

3. Briefly describe public involvement in this proposal to date and planned For children with a disability, parent focus groups were held to look at transitions. A Development Officer has been seconded from education to engage with schools and parents.

The Senior Champions Board have been looking at the process of leaving/moving on from care, including how they could be better involved in early planning to consider their care and support options into early adulthood. They will continue to look at this over the next year and the plan is to share their thoughts and views in Autumn/Winter 2023 with senior management.

May 2024 - Young people have been encouraged to participate in the Care Inspectorate Review. The Corporate Parenting team have also held a session re TCAC with the senior champions.

12/08/2024 - This IIA has been reviewed as requested at P&S committee when approving the policy. There is currently a Scottish Government consultation on 'moving on' which also covers continuing care and is including children and young people's views and carers views. Edinburgh's response to the consultation will be formulated through a questionnaire and discussions. After the consultation another policy update and IIA will be required for the annual review in spring 2025, which will include more robust engagement prior to the policy review being approved.

Care Leaver Transitions Consultation Engagement Event (22/10/2024) – Event attended by young people from variety of settings (foster care, kinship care,

residential, secure and continuing care), two Scottish Government representatives and three Council colleagues.

Within the Through Care and Aftercare (TCAC) service, there is a dedicated worker whose remit is to engage with care experienced adults who are working with the Council's Justice Services. This colleague has been engaging with care experienced adults, ensuring that they have the opportunity to have their views represented and taken into consideration as part of development of relevant services and associated documentation.

While developing any policy or procedure, the views of people with care experience are actively being sought. Recent examples include development of our Secure Care procedure and CALM physical intervention procedure. This can be done through in person sessions or via Microsoft Forms with support from social workers, support workers and where appropriate our partners.
