Queensferry Living Well Locally – Stakeholder Workshop Feedback Summary

Tuesday 18 February 2025, at Rosebery Hall

Background

Following on from a successful Queensferry Asset & Services workshop in February 2023 a second event was held on Tuesday the 18 February at Roseberry Hall. Council Service representatives, Third Sector Organisations and Partner Providers were invited to attend the workshop. The purpose of the workshop was to share and update local stakeholders on how current projects in Queensferry were progressing and create another networking opportunity by bringing everyone together again.

The main aim was to share our vision for the Queensferry Campus and raise awareness of the community engagement process.

The workshop was attended by the following service providers:

City of Edinburgh Council; Local Ward Members, Strategic Asset Planning, High School and Primary School Leadership Teams, Facilities Management, Community Empowerment & Engagement, Libraries, Sport & Wellbeing, Heritage, Transport & Environment.

Other Agencies: Queensferry District Community Council, NHS, Police Scotland, Edinburgh Leisure, Rosebery Hall Management Team, Squids (After School), Queensferry Heritage Trust, Forth Bridges Tourism, Queensferry Parish Church Youth Team, Queensferry Priory Church, Queensferry History Group, Craigalmond Scout Group, Queensferry Men's Shed, Rotary Cub.

Objectives

To create an open and creative forum to discuss the proposals and gain a better understanding on whether the 'vision' presented meets the needs of the local community. Allowing service providers to come together and explore the concept in more detail, determine any positive or negative impact for their service area and

consider whether anything has been missed or should be explored further as part of this process to address any community concerns, changing priorities or aspirations.

Agenda:

- A brief update on all things Queensferry and introduce key officers: High Street Improvements, Active Travel Connections project, Museums review, accessibility audit Rosebery Hall.
- Progress update on all learning estate projects: new Builyeon Road PS, additional High School capacity.
- Discuss the Queensferry Campus Vision: strengths and shortcomings of the proposals.
- Queensferry District Community Council update on the communities Local Place Plan.

Workshop format, discussions & feedback

The format of the workshop was based around tables of service providers and community representatives to discuss the strengths and shortcomings of the Queensferry campus proposals and provide feedback on any other matters worth consideration.

Questions asked:

Question 1: Do you like the proposal for Queensferry Campus?

Questions 2: What are the strengths of the proposal? What opportunities does it present?

Question 3: What are the shortcomings of the proposal? Can we turn these into opportunities?

Key Feedback Themes:

Strengths

Level of Investment

The level of proposed investment in new and improved infrastructure and longer-term vision is generally welcomed and would appear to address some of the growing community's unmet needs. There is support for improving the quality, suitability and energy performance of buildings being retained and disposal of buildings that are life expired.

A New Community Hub

Bringing services together into a central location, with designated public access, as well as shared and flexible use of facilities, internal and external spaces by different service providers was viewed as beneficial.

Opportunities

Redevelopment of the Depot site

Many comments were made about exploring alternative uses for the depot site for an Early Years facility rather than the park or as designated drop off/pick up, parking or turning circle.

Traffic Improvements

Numerous suggestions were made about improving traffic and congestion in and around the school by either: closing Burgess Road permanently, introducing a one-way system, providing bus access only or restricting access during pick up/drop off and break times.

Service Transformation

A new Community Hub has the potential to improve the range and availability of Council and Partner Provided services being delivered in Queensferry. Creating an opportunity to deliver multi-generational activity programmes, through improved partnership working and increased opening and operational hours.

Shortfalls

Loss of Park/Greenspace

Whilst many understood the rationale for building on the park, many thought that this was a compromise too far and want alternative options to be reconsidered particularly developing on the depot site to protect the much-valued open greenspace.

Road Safety

A longer-term solution is required to resolve the current situation with traffic congestion, poor parking behaviour and road safety concerns for pupils as part of the campus proposals.

Detailed Design Proposals

Many were looking for more detailed design and layout proposals, not yet developed, to determine the allocation, types of space and facilities that might be available for the residents and school before any added value could be assessed.

Operational Management

It was difficult for some services to determine how the flexible use and sharing of space might work in the future with different service providers without knowing what changes will be made to the existing operating model.

Access to Sports and Leisure Facilities

Many concerns were raised about the lack of leisure provision in the area, and restricted access and affordability of existing facilities for the community.
