Executive Summary

This Local Place Plan has been prepared by Balerno Community Council under the provisions of the Town and Country Planning (Scotland) Act 1997, as amended by the Planning (Scotland) Act 2019. It has been developed with regard to the City of Edinburgh's CityPlan 2030 and National Planning Framework 4 and sets out the community's priorities for the period 2030 - 2040.

Building on the vision established in the 2019 Community Plan, the Local Place Plan reflects extensive community engagement undertaken during 2025 and 2026, together with evidence from recent local studies, including the Deanpark Primary School Parent Council traffic report. It provides an updated, community-led framework to inform future planning, investment and regeneration.

Balerno is recognised as a distinctive village with a strong identity, exceptional natural surroundings and a vibrant community. Its location at the gateway to the Pentland Hills, together with its heritage, green spaces, schools and community facilities, are widely valued by residents and form the foundation of the Plan's vision.

The principal message emerging from community engagement is that Balerno should focus on improving existing infrastructure and services rather than accommodating significant expansion. Residents place a high priority on protecting the Green Belt, safeguarding the village's landscape setting and character, and ensuring that investment is directed towards community facilities, sustainable transport, accessibility and environmental enhancement.

The Local Place Plan sets out a shared vision for a resilient and sustainable Balerno that protects its unique character while responding to future needs. It provides a clear framework to guide planning decisions and investment, ensuring that future development enhances the village, supports local communities and preserves the qualities that make Balerno a distinctive and valued place to live, work and visit.

The Local Place Plan proposes a coordinated programme of improvements centred around eight key themes.

Protecting Balerno's Character remains a fundamental priority. The community wishes to safeguard the Green Belt, conserve the historic village centre, protect and enhance the Conservation Area and ensure that future development respects the scale, heritage and rural setting that make Balerno unique. Investment should focus on regeneration, brownfield opportunities and improving existing neighbourhoods rather than outward expansion.

Enhancing Green Infrastructure is seen as essential to residents' quality of life. Proposals include creating better connected walking routes, improving parks and play spaces, enhancing the Water of Leith corridor, developing the Ravelrig Walled Garden as a community asset and a comprehensive network of accessible paths.

Investing in Community Infrastructure is another key aspiration. The community supports the creation of a modern multi-purpose community hub, improved facilities for young people, enhanced health and wellbeing provision, a transformed library and improvements to Balerno's Main Street to create a safer, more attractive and vibrant village centre.

Education remains one of the community's highest priorities. There is strong support for the redevelopment or major refurbishment of Balerno High School as a modern community campus, together with safer access to schools, improved sports and community facilities, and measures to address congestion around Dean Park Primary School.

Transport and Movement proposals seek to create a village where walking, wheeling and cycling become easier and safer. Priorities include improved pedestrian crossings, safer routes to schools, enhanced pavements and cycle infrastructure, better public transport connections, improved parking management and longer-term aspirations for improved rail connectivity.

Recognising the importance of the **Pentland Hills**, the Plan requests improved safer walking access from Balerno, sensitive path improvements within the Pentlands, and better signage and visitor facilities while protecting the landscape, biodiversity and rural character that define this nationally important environment.

The Local Place Plan also recognises the opportunity presented by the future restoration of **Ravelrig Quarry**. Community engagement identified four preferences and a recognise that further engagement will be necessary.

Finally, the Plan recognises that high-quality **digital infrastructure** has become an essential part of modern community life. Improved broadband, resilient mobile connectivity and future-proof digital infrastructure will support residents, businesses, education and community resilience.

Introduction

This is the Balerno Local Place Plan 2026 (the Plan) prepared in accordance with s15A of and Sch 19 to the Town and Country Planning (Scotland) Act 1997. The time frame which the Plan will cover is 2031 to 2040 as part of the Edinburgh Local Development Plan.

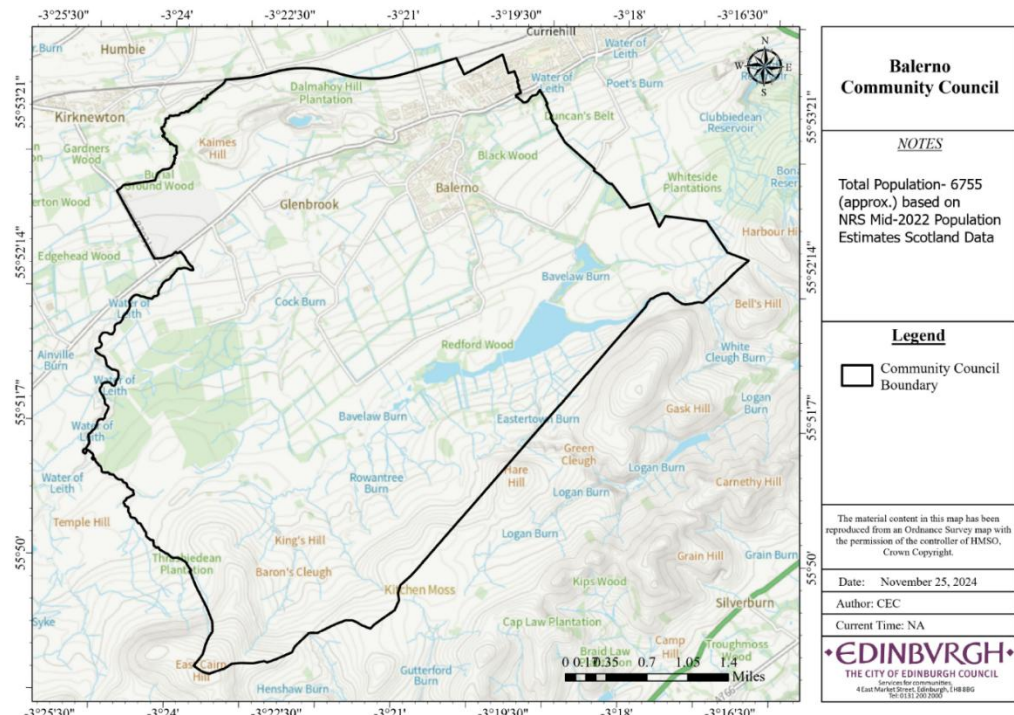
This Plan is made by the Balerno Community Council (the Council), the Council having noted that Local Place Plans are authorised by s 15A of and Sch 19 to the Town and Country Planning (Scotland) Act 1997 as amended by s14 of the Planning (Scotland) Act 2019. In preparing this Plan the Council, as required by para 1(4)(a) to Sch 19 referred to, has had regard in particular both to CityPlan2030 as the relevant local development plan and also to National Planning Framework 4.

The Plan has been prepared by Balerno Community Council (the Council) following consultation with the Balerno community (the community) over the spring and summer of 2026.

The Council is the most local representative body for the area to which the Plan applies, which is the area shown.

A Local Place Plan in Scotland is a community-led, registered document that sets out proposals for the development and use of land in a specific local area, in this case Balerno. Its purpose is to empower the Balerno community to voice its aspirations for Balerno's future, highlighting local needs regarding land, buildings, and development. Once registered with the City of Edinburgh Council (CEC), which is the local planning authority, the Balerno Local Place Plan must be taken into account by CEC when it develops its local development plan, CityPlan2040.

The Council has engaged with the Balerno community to identify priorities, through a public consultation both electronic and hard copy, and through public meetings and engagement at public event. The results of that engagement form the basis of this Plan

The Council is satisfied that there is a broad shared vision and a sense of belonging for everybody in Balerno.

In setting out what Balerno is, the Council have tried to reflect as accurately as it can what is going on.

The purpose of this Local Place Plan is:

- To help the Community Council and Edinburgh City Council consider the impact of planning applications on our local community.
- To inform City of Edinburgh Council's review of the Local Development Plan.
- To influence investment by The City of Edinburgh Council and Pentland Hills Regional Park Joint Committee, other public bodies, funders, landowners and businesses in ways that support our local community.

In preparing this plan the Council aims to encourage improvement in the quality of life of the community. We would like to encourage the community at large to continue involvement in identifying what needs to be done and in helping to achieve the changes sought.

Community Engagement

Background Previous Engagement and Findings

In recording the views of the community, the Council is satisfied that there is a broad shared vision and a sense of belonging for everybody in Balerno.

In producing this Local Place Plan, the council has taken account of previous community plans: the Council's Community Plan published in 2019, expressed in 'Our Village Our Community' document; and a public consultation undertaken by Balerno Village Trust in 2025.

The consultation process

The Council has engaged with the Balerno community to identify priorities. The results of that engagement form the basis of this Plan

Questionnaire: A total of approximately 256 responses were received to the community questionnaire survey. Respondents included residents of varying ages, with a mix of those living and/or working in Balerno. The survey gathered views on infrastructure, services, environment, transport, economic development, and community wellbeing to inform key themes to develop.

A public meeting, held in March 2026 chaired by Planning Aid Scotland, and involved communication of the Local Place Plan process and standing within a Local Development Plan.

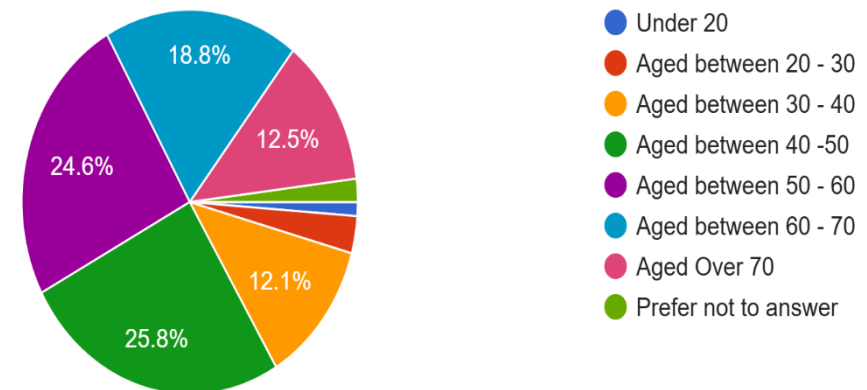


Chart: Pie chart showing age demographic of respondent to questionnaire

Engagement continued as Community Council members engaged members of the public at the local Farmer's markets in the Main Street of Balerno on four separate occasions. Additional meetings were held with local groups and key stakeholders in education.

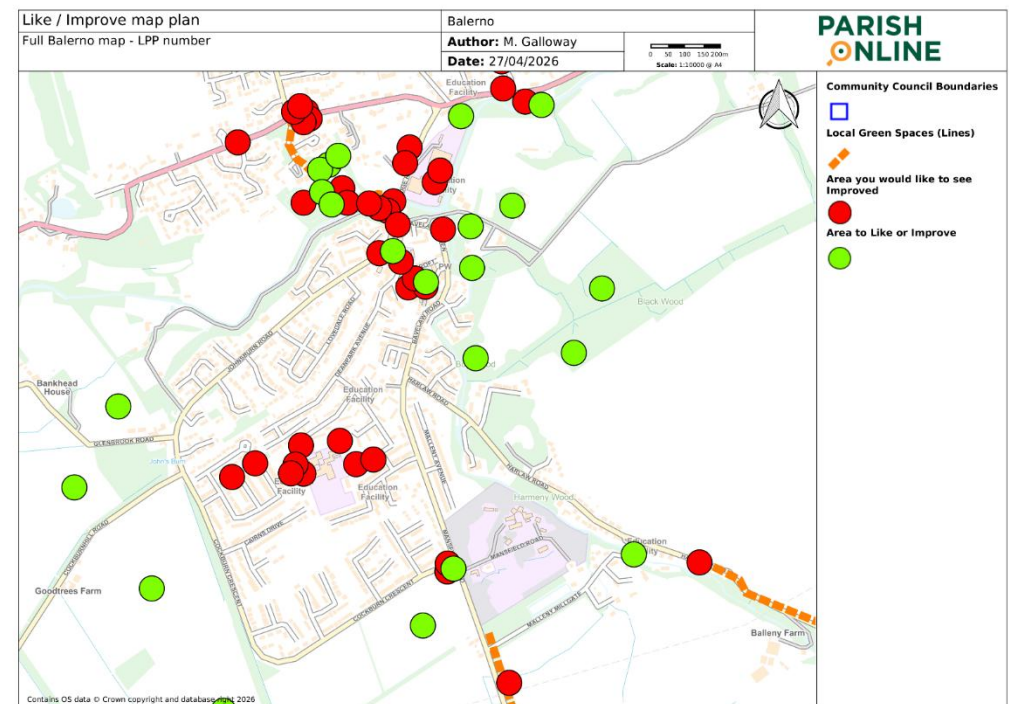
A Public meeting in July was attended by 150 and chaired by Planning Aid Scotland. It was convened after the analysis of the engagement. Proposals were presented to permit preferences to be identified.

The survey responses submitted following the meeting indicates a strong sense of place and community in Balerno, with clear priorities centred on protecting its environmental assets while addressing infrastructure and service pressures. The findings demonstrate broad alignment with sustainable development principles, particularly in relation to active travel, environmental protection, and community well-being.

A working group has endeavoured to ensure the consultation has been wide, deep, and meaningful and the aim is for the final plan to be as representative and inclusive as possible.

Introduction to Themes / Summary Proposals

Below summarises the key preferences for the themes, which have been derived from the community engagement. A selection are highlighted in the next sections, but a full list of the proposals for each theme can be found in the Appendix B.

Theme 1: Green Belt, Housing & Development

Cross-Cutting Priorities

Across all responses and proposals, several consistent priorities emerge:

- Improved **transport infrastructure**, particularly active travel and public transport

Across Green Spaces, Education, Transport and & Movement and the Pentlands Theme areas the community repeatedly requested improvements to active and safe travel and public transport improvements.

- Protection and enhancement of **green spaces, Conservation Area, and the Green Belt**

The community spoke strongly about the desire to protect and enhance the Green Belt, Conservation Area, and green spaces to protect the elements they value in Balerno, which combined make Balerno special.

- Increased provision for **young people and community facilities**

There was a strong desire for improved community facilities. The reduction of community access and facilities within the High School is something that has affected the community as a whole.

- Support for a **vibrant local economy**

- Measures to improve **road safety and traffic management**

Community engagement responses highlighted undeniable concerns over safety of children and elderly people. As Balerno has grown the road network is under strain with increased vehicle movement. Areas around Deanpark Primary, Lanark Road West and Bridge Road were identified as key areas.

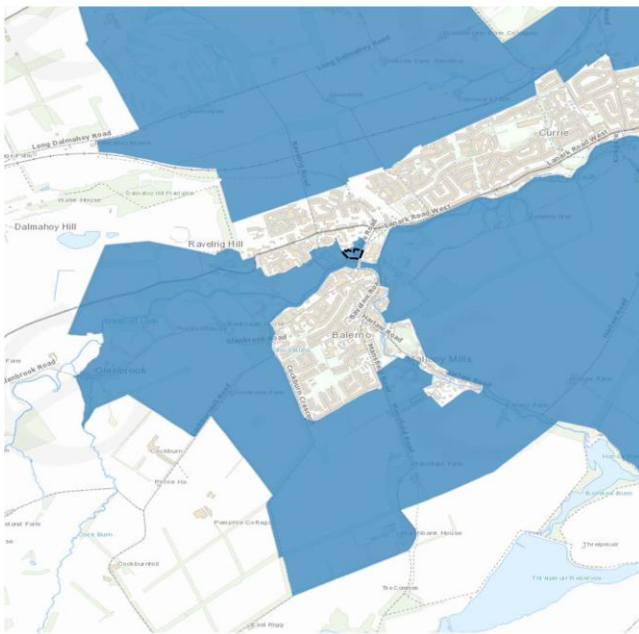

The map shows the current area designated as Green belt (shown in blue) in the City Plan 2030.

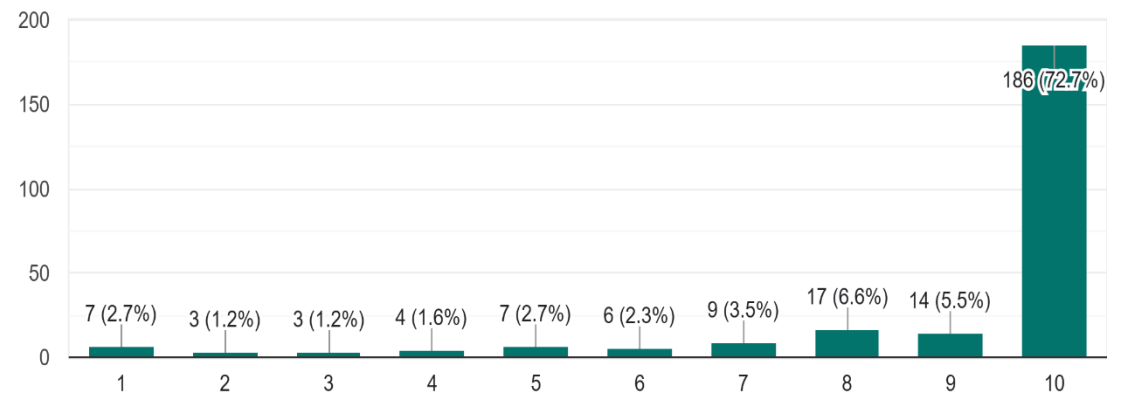
The proposal in this Local Plan recommends no changes of this area but does suggest a strengthening of the boundaries.

Summary

- ▶ There is overwhelming support for maintenance of the Green Belt around Balerno. Responses from the questionnaire show the community highly value the green belt.
- ▶ There is a prevailing view that regeneration should not extend to any expansion of the built environment.
- ▶ Having said that there is also serious concern about the absence of necessary infrastructure (e.g. schools, medical facilities).

The Community highlighted three priorities from the engagement:

Reference	Proposal	Reason why important
GB2	Formal Presumption Against Development to protect Green Belt - Reinforce "no development stance".	The community feels strongly against any development in Green Belt designated land, as this would impact on the rural village identity and risk the history and heritage of Balerno.
GB3	Focus Investment on Existing Infrastructure. Priority Areas: High School; Healthcare; Transport improvements.	In connection with proposals under Education, it is recognised that the school facilities are needing replaced. The community would like focus to be on replacing the schools, healthcare and transport.
GB1	Adopt a "Regeneration First, Expansion Last" Policy: Prioritise Upgrading existing Brownfield redevelopment. Brownfield developments are built on land that has already been developed, including vacant or derelict land, and unused buildings. Explicitly rejecting erosion of the Green Belt.	Community Engagement identified a desire for existing brownfield sites to be used for redevelopment.

Following public consultation there were three key proposals that emerged:

1. Improve the path between the Ravelrig Estate, the Walled Garden and Bridge Road (GS1)

Proposal: The community would like to see the path between Ravelrig Wynd and Bridge Road developed and the old walled garden of the Ravelrig Estate developed as a site for community use (shown in red on map).

Why this is needed:

Over recent years much of the new housing development in the village has been to the north side of the village along Lanark Road West. The only path that links these areas with the main centre of the village and both schools has a poor surface, is unlit and only useable in fine dry weather.

Within this area there is also a Historic Walled Garden, which in effect was left over after housing was built on all suitable parts of the estate. The community has a keen interest in this site and would like to see it used for community benefit.

What the community said:

"A proper path from Ravelrig Gait to Bridge Road. Most of the year it's a muddy mess."

"A community garden in the old walled garden would be an amazing community resource."

"The old Ravelrig estate has potential to provide space for dog walking, running or just relaxing in a park."

2. Improve Marchbank Park (GS6)

Proposal:

The community would like to see Marchbank Park improved and developed for the community, including clearer signage of paths, more benches, outdoor gym equipment, creation of a structure for carers to sit under and playpark improvements.

Why this is needed:

Adjacent to Dean Park Primary School, Marchbank Park is the main park in Balerno and contains the main playpark for the Village. It was created 50 years ago as part of the first expansion south of the village known locally as “The Bells Estate”. It is managed by the City of Edinburgh Council and has Fields in Trust status. Facilities in the park are currently limited, there is a set of football goals, solid paths, which can flood in the winter, three benches and two picnic tables. Marchbank Park houses the main playpark of the village, however, play equipment is centred on younger children and there is nothing for older children/teenagers.

What the community said:

“Balerno is surrounded by greenery but if you look closer there's a limited space where people can enjoy it.”

“The paths are terrible, there's no lampposts if you want to go for a walk in winter months, there are not many benches where older and younger could sit and chat.”

“The only park is in Marchbank area which is not local for many. There is also a need for more local playparks for children.”

3. Improvement of the Water of Leith Path and signposted further upstream into the village (GS2)

Proposal:

The community would like to see the Water of Leith Path signposted into the village and improved, preferably with lighting.

Why this is needed:

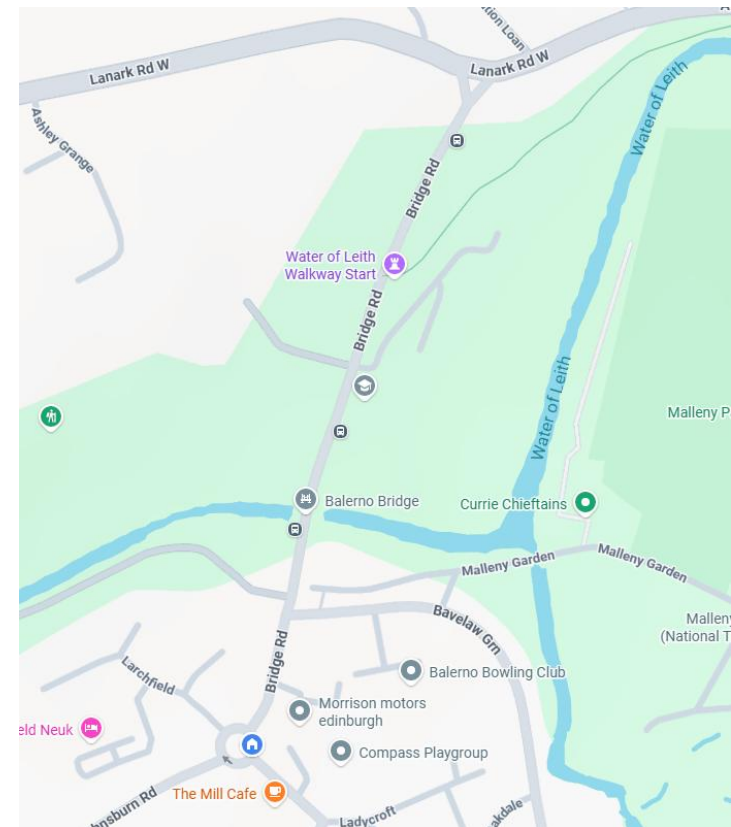
The Water of Leith has played an important role in the development of Balerno, initially driving the paper mills that provided the main employment in the village. The Water of Leith pathway originally housed the railway that served the village. In more recent times a popular footpath has been created which links Balerno to Leith along a 13-mile footpath.

The current footpath ends at Bridge Road, a seven-minute walk on a busy main road from the village centre. The route into the historic village centre and local shops/restaurants is not clear. During the winter the path can be quite dark, and the provision of lighting would enable it to feel safer year-round.

What the community said:

"I enjoy cycling but avoid cycling on roads. I like cycling with my children, but I feel very nervous doing this, especially if we are trying to access Harlaw, Threipmuir and the water of Leith."

"Better lighting along the Water of Leith walkway."

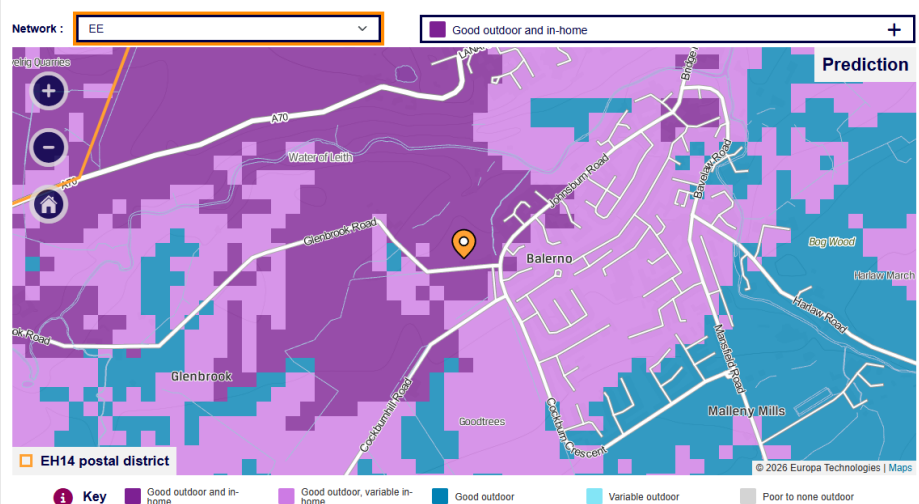
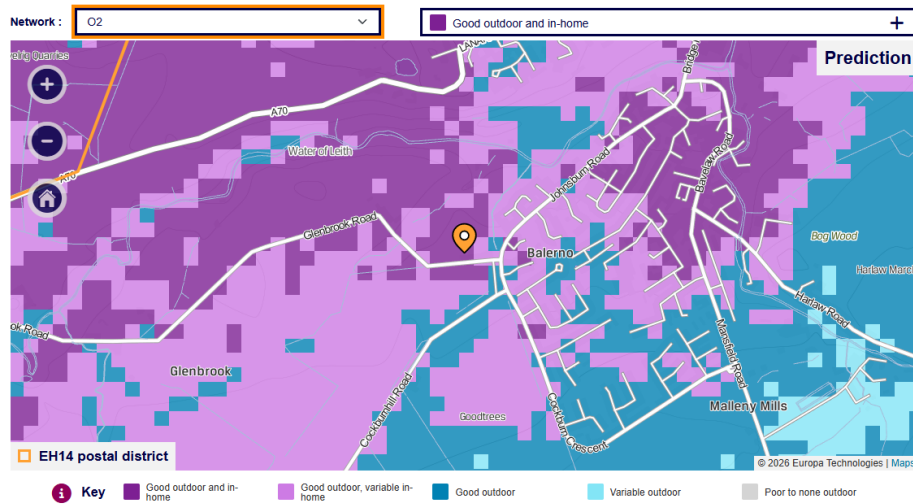

Theme Area 3: Infrastructure - Digital

Digital Infrastructure is key for the local community. Situated 10 miles outside of Edinburgh, with an average commute of 1 hour, many residents rely on high-speed Broadband to work part of the week from home. Whilst the quality of Broadband and Mobile coverage is good and most residents have a choice of provider; there are some areas where there are gaps.

The maps below indicate the patchy or poorer quality of mobile coverage in Balerno.

Whilst the community is supportive of improvements to digital infrastructure, they would like this done in a way that does not adversely impact the quality of pavements or roads in the area.

Following public consultation there were four key proposals that emerged:

1. **Introduce a local policy requiring: Co-ordination between providers; shared trenching and ducts; Alignment with road resurfacing schedules; Stronger standards for road/ pavement reinstatement**

Proposal: The community would like to see better coordination between providers when roads and pavements are required to be dug up and better reinforcement for pavements and roads to be reinstated.

Why this is needed:

Balerno was one of the first areas to receive City Fibre Broadband, however there were significant issues which resulted in both delays and poor-quality repairs to the pavements some of which still remain today.

What the community said:

"Just fix the roads and pavements properly when damaged like we pay for."

"Roads to be reinstated to new condition. Potholes are often at sites of roadworks."

2. **Ensure 100% coverage across Balerno; Prioritise currently under served streets; Require providers to publish clear rollout timelines**

Proposal: The community would like to see high speed Broadband available in all areas of Balerno.

Why this is needed:

Whilst most people in Balerno have access to a number of providers, there are exceptions to this. Whilst the city fibre roll-out covered most areas of the village, it was not taken beyond the main core. There are a number of houses at both Glenbrook Village and Steading that don't currently have adequate broadband, groups of farm properties were not covered and also the area on Harlaw Road beyond the bridge was not connected.

What the community said:

"Fibre optic broadband in all areas of Balerno."

"There are still areas e.g. Glenbrook with limited fibre broadband. Residents of Harlaw Road also missed out on city fibre."

"A choice of providers - currently heavily reliant on Virgin Broadband and service is often interrupted."

3. Mobile Coverage Improvement Plan: Work with telecom providers to identify signal "Black Spots"; Install targeted small-scale masts or boosters.

Proposal: The community would like to see Mobile phone coverage improved in the area and greater infrastructure sharing between networks.

Why this is needed:

Mobile phones are essential for everyday life, from speaking to people to checking bus times. Within Balerno only two providers EE and O2 provide 5G coverage sufficient for indoor use in Balerno <https://www.signalchecker.co.uk/balerno>.

What the community said:

"mobile coverage within Balerno village can be inconsistent, so improvements in this area would be beneficial."

"Improved mobile phone network coverage and high speed/fibre broadband for everyone."

4. Environmentally sensitive rollout guidelines: Underground cabling where possible ; Careful placement of masts ; Avoid large-scale developments like data centres.

Proposal: The rural nature and greenspaces are key to the village environment and the community are not in favour of pylons and large-scale developments such as data centres.

Why this is needed:

Balerno is a rural village surrounded by Edinburgh's greenbelt and local countryside area.

It is recognised there will be an intensification of electricity infrastructure or introduction of renewable energy development within the landscape. This could alter the rural character of the landscape; the community would like to ensure there are careful siting of cabling infrastructure and associated planting strategies.

What the community said:

"No data centre that would harm environmental and wildlife."

"No AI data centres anyway near Balerno."

"No more development the roads are congested no data centres."

Theme Area 4: Infrastructure – Social

Balerno is a village, situated on the outskirts of Edinburgh. As a community it is rural in nature.

Community is important to people in the village, driven by highly skilled and committed community volunteers and anchor organisations such as Balerno Community Council and Balerno Village Trust (BVT). The success of our community is the result of input and effort of countless local organisations.

Community spaces are also important to the people of Balerno. In 2023, Balerno Community Council and Balerno Village Trust consulted with the community over the future of the local Police Station which had been closed for ten years. This led to the Police Station being acquired and redeveloped for community benefit.

Following public consultation there were five key proposals that emerged, others are listed below:

Note - in para 3 above in line 1 'Balerno Village Trust' and Balerno Community Council' has been amended to read 'Balerno Community Council and Balerno Village Trust'.

1. Access & Safety improvements:

Implement: Safe school travel plan (Cycling & walking routes);
Parking redesign near schools;
Better disabled access to key sites: Community centre; Balerno High School; Library

Proposal: The community would like to see better disabled access to community facilities for all users, including safe walking routes, parking and disabled access to key sites.

Why this is needed:

Finding parking spaces in the village can often be difficult with the two main car parks often full for most of the day and surrounding roads busy. Journeys to school can be difficult – the spread of the village has led to many houses outwith reasonable walking distance for children resulting in increased car journeys. Disabled access to sites is often non-existent – for example the Balerno Community Centre is not accessible to wheelchairs or buggies.

What the community said:

“Safer paths and more disabled walkways.”

“Disabled access for independent disabled people. Those who do not have someone with them.”

“Parking can be a bit difficult. We walk from our home but can appreciate that older residents may not be able to do so.”

2. **Health & Wellbeing improvements:** Deliver: Community gym; Outdoor fitness equipment in parks

Proposal: The community would like to see more opportunities for fitness including a community gym and outdoor fitness equipment.

Why this is needed:

The nearest mainstream Edinburgh Leisure Centre to Balerno is over 6 miles away in Dalry and 45 minutes by public transport. Whilst there are nearer private facilities (e.g Oriam at Heriot-Watt, three miles), these are not always affordable to everyone in the community.

In the past Balerno High School was open for public swimming in the evenings, however due to the new School in Currie this is no longer open to the community.

What the community said:

"A gym in the village would be great."

"Upgrade school plus more facilities for outside people to use like gym swimming for public."

"A gym like that at Currie built for pupil and community use."

"Marchbank Park is our only park and there is little investment in this. More seating areas, a bigger play park and places for people to meet outdoors. I would like to see gym equipment installed around the park."

3. **Library transformation:** Expand or relocate to larger space: Add - Co-working/ study areas; Workshops (skills, crafts, digital); Community programming

Proposal: The community would like to see the Library in Balerno transformed with co-working/study areas and space for workshop and community programming.

Why this is needed:

The current Library in Balerno is two rooms in the annex of the old Primary School, it stocks a small section of books, is only open limited hours (32 hours per week including two evenings and Saturday).

What the community said:

"Library hours increased."

"Local library which is very small."

"The library could be greatly improved."

4. **Balerno Main Street: Install controlled access.** Access only allowed for: disabled badge holders; deliveries (time restricted); emergency services.

Proposal: The community would like to see controlled access onto Main Street, and this restricted to disabled badge holders, deliveries during reasonable times and emergency services.

Why this is needed:

In recent years we have experienced a gradual change within the Main Street such that it is now becoming a vibrant centre of hospitality within the village, with Bars and restaurants the principal businesses in the street. This change does add pressure to parking issues in the village particularly in the evenings or nursery pickup times.

From the questionnaire there were some 66 responses highlighting respondents concerns about the presence of vehicles within the pedestrian zone. The overwhelming desire is for enforcement of the pedestrian zone, some advocating a complete ban on cars with others acknowledging the needs of delivery drivers, emergency vehicles, residents and those who are blue badge holders.

What the community said:

“Penalising the many people who park on Main Street.”

“Main Street, pedestrian area enforced.”

5. **Create Community Hub:** Develop (or upgrade a central hub that includes - gym; youth space; café/social area. Workshop rooms

Proposal: the community would like to see developed a community hub to bring a number of services together (Gym, youth space, workshop rooms)

Why this is needed:

Balerno Village Trust's purchase of Balerno Police Station and transformation into a community hub has been very much welcomed and supported by the community, however development of this site is limited to what charitable funds can be obtained. Whilst there is a demand for youth provision in the village, the funding available for this is limited due to the social demographics of the area. Currie Rugby club is developing plans for a new Gym, however again these plans are dependent on charitable funding.

What the community said:

"I'm excited about the development of the police station and hope this will help to provide a new community hub with opportunities for community connection and enrichment."

Theme Area 5: Education

Secondary Education – Balerno High School

Balerno High School opened in 1984 and has a current operating capacity of 850-900 students. Balerno High School roll projection is 892 for 2026 against a planned capacity of 924, with a roll projection of 900 in 2034. It was recently awarded by UNICEF a Gold Rights Respecting award. In 2018 City of Edinburgh Council proposed Balerno High School be rebuilt, on its existing site, with a capacity of 1200 pupils¹. That proposal was however replaced in 2022 with proposals for a retrofit. An increasing school enrolment, an aging building, increased maintenance costs are putting stress on the educational capacity.

By 2040 Balerno High School will be 60 years old, and the community is strongly in favour of the full rebuild of the school.

With increasing schools roll, this is also placing pressures on the traffic and pedestrian activity, highlighted by residents in the survey.

This Local Place Plan, accordingly, seeks the council to consider and make proposals on a new Balerno High School.

Primary Education – Deanpark Primary School

Summary of Proposal

This proposal focuses on improving the experience and safety of pupils, parents, and staff at Dean Park Primary School. It addresses significant concerns around unsafe and congested parking during drop-off and pick-up times, as well as longer-term pressures from a growing population and outdated school infrastructure. The proposal combines traffic management solutions with longer-term considerations such as additional school provision and expanded play spaces. It supports work by the Parent Council in their recent traffic survey.

Local Context

Dean Park Primary School was built in 1972 and is the only primary school in Balerno. Balerno is experiencing population growth, resulting in increased pressure on school capacity and surrounding infrastructure. The current school building has been described as outdated and “not fit for purpose,” although the quality of teaching is highly regarded. Projections suggest that its 546 capacity will be inadequate by 2028 with projections indicating numbers of 548 in 2028 to 678 in 2034.

Community feedback highlights Dean Park Primary School traffic as a key area of concern. Parking conditions during drop-off and pick-up times were described as “diabolical,” with issues including congestion, unsafe road use, and limited pedestrian safety. Narrow streets around the school further exacerbate traffic and safety challenges.

Objectives

- Improve safety for children and families travelling to and from school
- Reduce traffic congestion and unsafe parking behaviours
- Encourage active travel such as walking and cycling
- Address long-term capacity and infrastructure needs for primary education in Balerno
- Enhance outdoor play opportunities for children

Theme Area 6: Transport and Movement

The Local Place Plan identifies transport, movement and accessibility as key priorities for the future of **Balerno**. Community responses indicate a strong desire for a safer, more accessible and better-connected village, where walking, wheeling and public transport are more practical for everyday journeys, while traffic impacts are managed in a way that protects residential amenity and village character.

Vision

Balerno should function as a village where people of all ages and abilities can move safely and conveniently, with priority given to walking, wheeling, public transport and road safety. Future transport improvements should support access to schools, local services, community facilities, the village centre and wider regional connections.

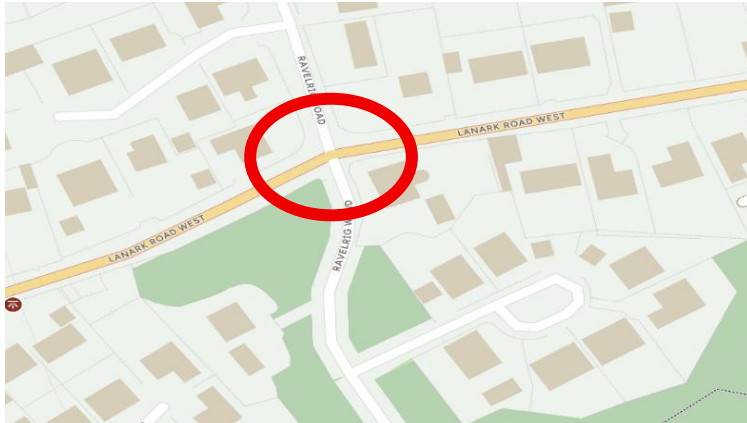

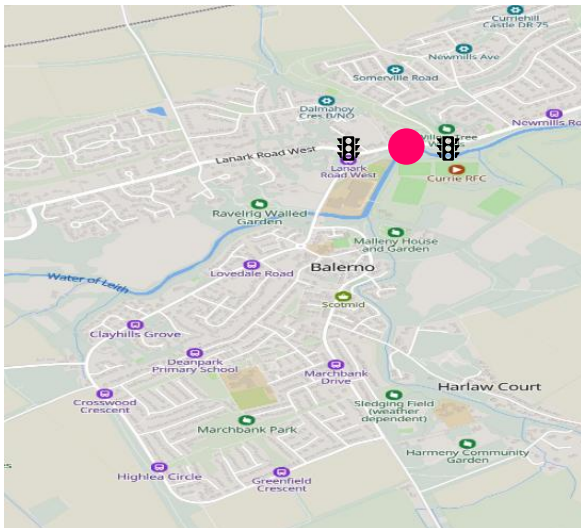


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Map: Proposed site of pedestrian crossing (T2)

Theme Area 7: Pentland Hills

The **Pentland Hills** form one of Balerno's defining landscape assets and are highly valued by residents for walking, cycling, informal recreation, wildlife, scenery and wellbeing. The **Harlaw Reservoir** and **Threipmuir Reservoir** area functions as an important gateway between Balerno and the wider Pentlands.

Consultation responses show strong support for improving access to the Pentlands, particularly through safe off-road walking and cycling links, better path quality, clearer wayfinding and modest visitor facilities.

At the same time, respondents consistently emphasised that the Pentlands' open landscape, rural character, biodiversity and tranquillity should be protected from overdevelopment.

Policy Objective

To strengthen Balerno's connection with the **Pentland Hills** by improving safe access and enjoyment in ways that protect landscape quality, biodiversity and the area's distinctive rural character.

Local Place Plan Policy

Development, investment and land management proposals affecting Balerno's relationship with the **Pentland Hills** should support the following principles:

Proposal 1. Create a formal proposal for a safe off-road walking and cycling route linking Balerno with both Harlaw and Threipmuir reservoirs. (P1)

Priority should be given to creating and improving safe, attractive and accessible walking, wheeling, cycling, and riding routes between Balerno and the **Harlaw Reservoir / Threipmuir Reservoir gateway**.

This should include:

- safe off-road links;
- improved crossings where roads interrupt routes;
- better connections from residential areas, schools and village facilities;
- path design that is inclusive for a wide range of users, including families, older people and less confident walkers or cyclists.

In connection with this, but within the Pentlands: Path quality and wayfinding

A continuing programme of path maintenance and incremental improvement should be supported.

Measures should include:

- drainage, surfacing and erosion repair;
- better route definition where paths are unclear;
- low-key signage, route marking and walking-time information;
- interpretation that promotes understanding of landscape, heritage, ecology and responsible access.

Why is this needed?

There was a strong support from the community to create safe, well-connected active travel link between Balerno and the Pentlands. The current route uses rural roads which are deemed dangerous. Provision of safe routes will encourage access for residents and visitors, while protecting the landscape and natural environment.

What the Community said:

"Better walk ways for disabled people."

"Better paths to help access by walking / cycling to the Hills, Better paths within the Pentland Hills, Way marked routes."

"Purpose made pathways to allow people to enjoy the hills in a responsible manner."

Proposal 2: Landscape, biodiversity and rural character - Resist any development that would urbanise, visually intrude upon or cumulatively erode the Landscape, biodiversity and rural character qualities (P5)

Proposals should protect and enhance the special qualities of the **Pentland Hills**, including:

- open views and skyline character;
- habitats, woodland and biodiversity;
- the sense of tranquillity and escape from the urban area;
- the overall rural and natural setting.

Development that would urbanise, visually intrude upon or cumulatively erode these qualities should be resisted.

Why is this needed?

A high value is placed on the Pentlands by residents of Balerno, its scenery, nature and tranquillity, by the community. It is something they wish to see preserved.

What the Community said:

"A wild place where nature and biodiversity is protected."

"Wildlife, native flora and fauna, and overall biodiversity should be protected. This includes preserving natural habitats, supporting ecosystem diversity, and preventing any development or activity that would disrupt or degrade the local environment."

"I want it preserved, protected, and nothing even remotely commercial permitted."

Proposal 3: Recreation management (P8)

The plan Supports a local management approach for the Pentlands based on designated camping areas only (if any); no fires / no disposable barbecues; seasonal ranger enforcement; clearer visitor information.

Recreational use of the Pentlands should be managed to minimise damage to landscape and habitats.

Support should be given to:

- responsible access information;
- ranger presence or local management measures where appropriate;
- camping controls based on designated areas, clear rules and fire prevention;
- provision of fire controls to prevent wildfires spreading. Increased resilience measures to support protection of the flora and fauna from wildfires;
- measures to reduce litter, path erosion and visitor pressure at sensitive locations.

Why is this needed?

Many respondents commented on the mess left by camping activities, and the risk posed by wildfire. In recognising the needs of campers, stronger management and action is supported to ensure the Pentlands can be enjoyed by all. With recent wildfires affecting other wild areas there is a desire to ensure there are resilient plans in place to protect the Pentlands.

What the Community said:

"Rangers to ensure people clean up after themselves."

"More monitoring to ensure the people who use them respect the environment."

"Responsible camping only, no fires."

Theme Area 8: Ravelrig Quarry

Summary

Ravelrig Quarry is a site to the northwest of Balerno village. The quarry will be operational until 2050. There is currently no prospect that it would be extended beyond that date. Reinstatement of the site at closure would be the responsibility of the operator, currently Tarmac UK.

Balerno residents showed strong support for nature-based restoration through rewilding, woodland and grassland, with high demand for public access with some interest in destination leisure uses including climbing etc.

There was strong opposition to landfill and housing development, and concern to ensure management and legal guarantees of restoration.

The proposals represent the opinions given by residents. It is recognised this is the first stage of a further discussion whilst the quarry is still operational.

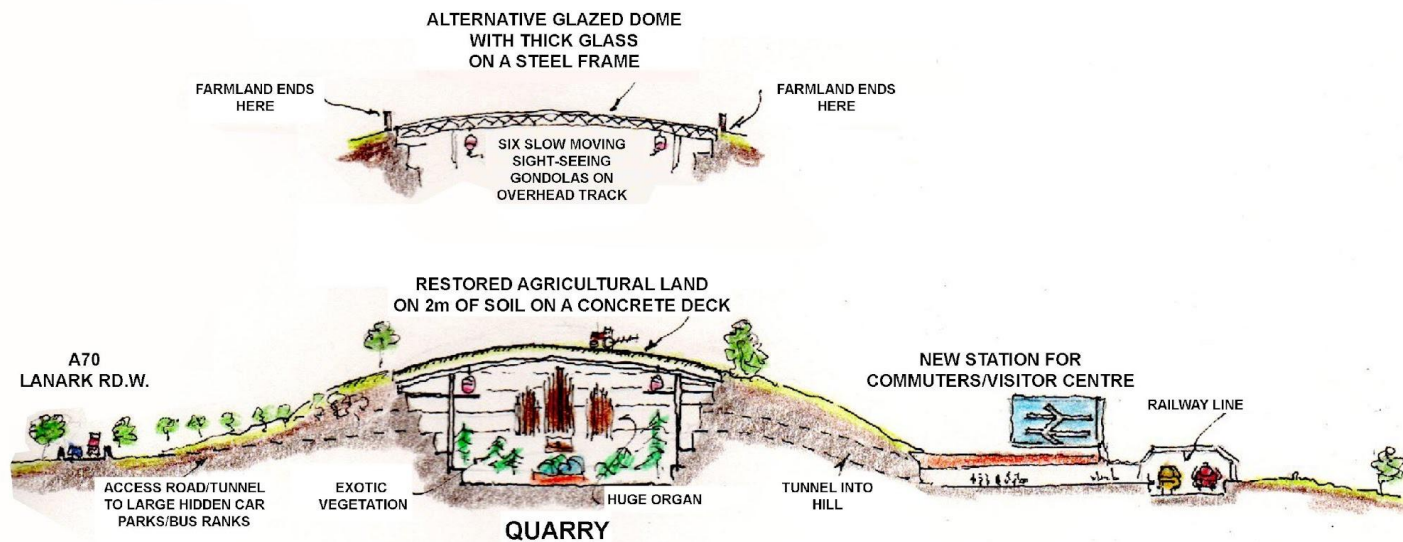
